Dear friends,

It's the annual Earsdon Scarecrow Festival next month. It's taking place throughout the lovely village of Earsdon, on the afternoon of Saturday 13th September, and I'd urge you to come along for some scarecrow-spotting, stalls in the Eccles Hall, and a happy atmosphere. This is our tenth anniversary festival, so we're trying to make it extra-special by having a Scarecrow Ball in the evening, in the Eccles Hall. All are welcome to the Ball, and at only £5 for a ticket and £10 for a family of up to two adults and two children, it won't break the bank. You can read more, and find out how to get tickets to the evening event, later in this magazine.

We make sure that the Scarecrow Festival coincides with the national Heritage Open Days, where buildings and interesting spaces across the country are opened for all to see. St Alban's Church in Earsdon always signs up to the Heritage Open Days, and so it's a great chance for visitors to come and look round our church. It's also a great chance for us, as Christians, to show off what the church* – and the Church** – are all about.

Mainstream Anglicans aren't great at advertising our faith. It's not really in our nature! When we think of evangelism - the promoting of the Faith - we often think of American-style preachers, and people who knock on our front doors and inquire as to whether we are 'saved'. I remember a fervent Christian once asking me where and how I met Jesus. It wasn't a question I was comfortable with, and I felt like answering "in the queue at Tesco's". (I didn't though. I just squirmed.)

But evangelism can take many forms. Showing people our church, introducing them to the places which speak to us of spirituality, and maybe even asking someone if they want to come to one of our services. These all count as evangelism.

We could perhaps use a different word than "evangelism". We could use the term "evangelisation". This word refers to the living-out of the Christian faith in our daily lives, as a tool for converting those we meet. It could be argued that this is a different focus from evangelism: it's not primarily about actively and directly trying to recruit people to our cause. The idea of evangelisation is that we make the Christian faith attractive to others by showing them how we live, instead of potentially intimidating them with the directness of some forms of promoting the Faith. I'm sure I'm not the only one who feels repelled by the idea of being asked about where and how they met Jesus.

This month, let's think about evangelism and evangelisation, to introduce people to the Christian faith, in ways which are natural to us and to them, and to avoid scaring them off.

PCC Digest

The Church Council met in the Eccles Hall on Wednesday July 16th. Here are some headlines...

- A local couple have kindly offered to pay for the painting of the church doors. We opted for the same shade of blue as the clock face.
- We were happy that the new arrangements for the sharing of the Peace were working well.
- Jean Bingham is beginning her role as Vicar's PA.
- We're currently losing £782 a month...
- ...however, we were delighted to hear that the Netty Project will be completely paid for once we make a final payment to our
- contractors in December. We have this money in hand ready to hand over. This is particularly good news, given how worried we were at April's Annual Meeting.
- St Alban's needs about £17,000 of fairly urgent repair work. A team was drawn together to work on grant applications.
- Work is in train to change the name of our bank account from 'Parochial Church Council of St Albans Earsdon Building Account' to 'The PCC of St Alban's and St John's'. This better reflects our joint identity as the parish of Earsdon and Backworth.
- The Church Council is to have an Away Day on September 27th to plan our church's life together up to the point of the vicar's retirement in March 2030.
- The Council unanimously adopted our covenant with our link parish of St Andrew, Majeleko, Tanzania [see next page for the full text]
- The Church clock will be serviced [and the time readjusted] in September.

Our covenant with St Andrew's Majeleko

St Andrew's is the church in our link village of Majeleko in Tanzania. This is what our side of the partnership aims to offer...

The family of faith in Earsdon and Backworth will...

- Faithfully pray for our sisters and brothers at St Andrew's, briefing our intercessors so that they can pray for individuals by name.
- Promote a WhatsApp group for easy communication between our communities.
- 3. Send money when we can, for e.g. ...
 - * The work of Conservation Agriculture in Majeleko
 - * The building of the new St Andrew's Church
 - * Emergency food supplies when required.
- 4. Aim to use technology to share in worship when we can.
- 5. Aim to visit each other if we can (if guests from Majeleko were able To come to the UK we would certainly collect you from the airport And offer free hospitality in our homes). There would be no obligation on anyone at the Earsdon and Backworth end to offer hospitality. We would look into possible grant aid support to defray the costs of such an exchange.
- 6. Look to learn each other's languages. For example, people from St Andrew's could teach people in Earsdon and Backworth the Lord's Prayer in Swahili. We could use technology to enable people in Majeleko (if they wanted to) to practice conversational English.

Weather Outlook for the month of August 2025.

Direct from the Captain's Charts.

The North East England long-range weather forecast indicates a continuation of generally changeable conditions with intermittent spells of rain or showers, interspersed with drier and brighter interludes. Temperatures are expected to be near average for this time of the year, but there is an increased chance of high pressure becoming more dominant towards the middle of the month, leading to more settled and warmer conditions.

The beginning of August.

The start of August will likely see a continuation of the current mixed weather patterns, with a mix of rain, showers, and some sunny spells.

Mid-August.

There is an increased chance of high pressure becoming more influential, potentially bringing more settled and warmer weather to the region.

Second Half of August.


High pressure is likely to be dominant, leading to predominantly dry weather with the possibility of occasional showers and/or thunderstorms.

Temperatures.

Temperatures are expected to be around or slightly above average, with the potential for brief hot and very humid spells to develop, especially in the east and south of the region.

In conclusion - expect a mix of weather conditions with a chance of warmer and more settled weather towards the middle through to the end of August...


North Atlantic Surface Pressure and weather front Chart Prediction for 12:00 hrs (UTC) on Sunday 3rd August 2025.



Our Changing Climate

The Royal Meteorological Society has recently published its report 'State of the UK Climate in 2024'. Some headlines...

The UK is warming: Since the 1980s the UK climate has been warming at a rate of approximately 0.25°C per decade. The last three years have all been in the UK's top five warmest on record.

Extremes are increasing: Over recent decades, temperature extremes have increased, becoming more frequent and more intense. For example, the hottest summer days have warmed around twice as much as average summer days in some UK areas when comparing the latest decade to 1961-1990.

Sea level rise is accelerating: UK sea levels have risen 19.5cm since 1901 with the last three years the three highest on record for annual mean sea level.

Winters are getting wetter: October 2023 to March 2024 was the wettest winter half-year on record. In a series from 1767, six of the ten wettest winter half-years (October to March) for England and Wales have been in the 21st Century so far.

Longer leaf-on season: The 2024 leaf-on season was 7 days longer than the 1999-2023 baseline. This was largely due to an earlier Spring.

Reduction in frost days: Air and ground frosts have reduced by around a quarter since the 1980s.

The report is based on observations from a network of several hundred weather stations, with temperature and rainfall data from these extending back to the 19th Century providing long term context. These data tell us how our climate has already changed here in the UK.

All in the month of August

It was...

It was 1,700 years ago, on 25th August 325 that the First Council of Nicaea ended with the adoption of the Nicene Creed. It summarised the Christian faith and established the doctrine of the Holy Trinity.

100 years ago, on 5th August 1925 that the Welsh nationalist political party Plaid Cymru was founded. Today it holds four of the 32 Welsh seats in the UK Parliament, 12 of the 60 seats in the Senedd, and 202 of the 1,231 principal local authority councillors.

90 years ago, on 21st August 1935 that John Hartley, British tennis player, died. He was the only clergyman ever to win Wimbledon, and in fact he was world number 1 player in both 1879 and 1880 – winning Wimbledon both years.

80 years ago, on 6th August 1945 that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on the city of Hiroshima in Japan. The centre of the city was totally destroyed, and about 80,000 people were killed immediately. A further 60,000 died by the end of the year, from injury or radiation. Hiroshima was the first city in history to be hit by a nuclear weapon.

Also 80 years ago, on 9th August, that the US Army Air Forces dropped an atomic bomb on Nagasaki, killing 40,000

immediately and more than another 33,000 by the end of the year. It was (so far) the last nuclear bomb to ever be dropped.

30 years ago, on 24th August 1995 that Microsoft released both Windows 95 operating systems and also Microsoft Office 95.

20 years ago, on 22nd August 2005 that the last Israeli settlers left the Gaza strip, ending 38 years of occupation.

Also 20 years ago, from 23rd to 30th August 2005 that Hurricane Katrina hit the Bahamas, Cuba and several southern US states. The city of New Orleans was flooded by 80 per cent when the levee system was overwhelmed. More than 1,800 people died. It was the costliest natural disaster in US history.

15 years ago, on 5th August 2010 that the Copiapo Mining Accident in Chile took place. A cave-in at the San Jose copper and gold mine trapped 33 workers 700 metres underground, and an international rescue operation was launched. The workers were brought to the surface on 13th October, 69 days later. Around one billion people watched their rescue on TV.

10 years ago, on 1st August 2015 that Cilla Black, pop singer and TV presenter died. Known for her hit song *Anyone who had a heart* and for presenting *Blind Date* and *Surprise Surprise*.

The Transfiguration

The story of the Transfiguration is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36). On that day, high up on a mountain, Peter, James and John were given a glimpse of Jesus' true glory. For Jesus' face began to shine as the sun, and his garments became white and dazzling. Then Elijah and Moses, suddenly appeared, talking with him.

Overwhelmed, Peter offered to build three tabernacles on that holy place, one for each. But God's 'tabernacling', or God's *dwelling* with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. It depends on being in the presence of Jesus, instead. And so a bright cloud covered them, and a voice spoke, saying that Jesus was his beloved son, whom the disciples should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our *listening* to Jesus. *Why did Moses and Elijah appear?* They represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. But now they were handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.
