THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH December 2021

Dear All,

When the clocks change, and the days shorten, life becomes very different. For a start, there is much less light to see by. These last few days I've found myself consulting the website 'Magic Seaweed'. Magic Seaweed gets its name because it gives the times of high and low tide. But it also gives the times for first light... sunrise... sunset... and last light. As I write, on Tuesday November 23rd first light was at 7.09, and last light will be at 4.34.

This is important for a dog walker. I tend to take our spaniel Dinah out for her 'pee-poo-sniff' first thing in the morning. And in the afternoon I often take her out for her second of two main walks in the day. There are great riches to be had out with the dog at this time of year. This morning, there were gorgeous splashes of early light on the bare trees. Yesterday afternoon, walking from Earsdon towards Backworth, we were headed straight into a glorious sunset. By the time we got back, 'last light' was nearly upon us and the tractor cutting a hedge near Church Farm stables needed to shine all its bright lights to be able to see.

It's a powerful thing that, in our part of the world, we celebrate Christmas at the darkest time of the year. At the beginning of John's Gospel, the baby of Bethlehem is a light coming into our darkness...

In Jesus was life, and that life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. Jesus, the true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.

'The world' can often feel like a very dark place indeed. Who would have thought, this time last year, that Christmas 2021 would itself be overshadowed by Covid? You will no doubt have seen pictures of the civil unrest in Holland and Austria over measures to try and curb the virus. Meanwhile, it's alleged that Belorussia has been using vulnerable migrants to put pressure on the European Union. A man drives his car into a Christmas parade in the US, killing five and injuring many more. A young white man is acquitted by a US jury on all counts, despite having shot and killed two people. And there is disappointment in the air over the outcome of the COP26 climate change summit.

Into this often dark world, Jesus comes as a light. His light shines with grace and truth and love and forgiveness. This Christmas, how we need that light.

Yet it's not all down to Jesus. Jesus the light calls everyone everywhere to be his disciples. And if He is 'the light' then - according to Jesus - so are we:

You are the light of the world Jesus tells his disciples. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. This Christmas, let's play our part in shining out with grace and truth and love and forgiveness. And let's do that before 'first light', and after 'last light'.

A very Happy Christmas to everyone at St Alban's, Earsdon Methodist, Immaculate Heart, St John's, and Our Lady and St Edmund.



Bishop visits HMS Queen Elizabeth

Bishop Paul Mason, Bishop to the Forces, recently flew out to our biggest warship, the aircraft carrier HMS Queen Elizabeth, in the Mediterranean. From RAF Akrotiri in Cyprus it took just over an hour by helicopter to reach the carrier. Upon arrival Commodore Steve Moorhouse allowed him and other guests to stand by the ramp on the flight deck to watch the



F35 jets take off, which he described as a" truly awesome experience".



He said later, "The experience of being on board an operational Aircraft carrier is really quite unique and it gives some insight into the professionalism, dedication and enthusiasm of the young men and women of the Royal Navy. There is only one chaplain on the carrier and on this deployment it is an Anglican,

Padre Ralph Barber, who facilitated Mass for me. Fr Robert Matau is on HMS Dragon which is part of the carrier group."

The Bishop and his family were parishioners of Our Lady and St Edmund in Backworth, and he was educated at St Thomas More High School in North Shields. The Captain's grandparents lived in Tynemouth where his father, Sir Nigel Essenhigh, retired First Sea Lord and Chief of the Naval Staff, was brought up before attending the Royal Naval College in Dartmouth.
