Seeds of Life: St Alban's and St John's 2025-2030

Hello everybody,

As I sit down to write this Thought, I'm aware that it might be of limited value to our Roman Catholic friends. However, as I guess lots of churches are facing similar challenges, I hope what's here might help Immaculate Heart and Star of the Sea to compare notes.

As trailed in September's 'Church Views', St Alban's and St John's recently had a Church Council Away Day. On Saturday September 27th a group of us went to Holy Saviour's in Tynemouth. We spent the day reflecting on where we've come from, assessing where we are now, and seeking God's guidance for our life together up to 2030.

For the headlines of our *looking back*, see pages 4 and 5 of September's magazine. Along the way, we reflected that the pandemic had brought us closer together as a congregation. Zoom worship, and our booking-in system, enabled us to get to know each other's names. In other ways, too, the pandemic benefited us by forcing our hand. For example, we were not able to mount Christmas Eve services full of excited children. So we mounted 'Journey to the Crib', turning St Alban's into an exploratory. Families came in at ten minute intervals to explore the church, see lots of nativities on display, and take souvenir pictures by a Christmas tree. We reflected that something like this shouldn't just be kept for pandemics, but could be part of our outreach in normal times.

When we came to assess where we are now, voices were quickly honest and realistic: 'are we stuck in our ways?' 'We've got a lovely, faithful, secure congregation... but it's quite static'. 'We have an ageing congregation, and the few new people that we see are themselves of a certain age'. 'We have a marketing issue – we're not communicating our brand'.

Then the ideas began to flow...

- 'There's lots of new building in our parish we could develop a Welcome Pack. It would have in it lots of information about our churches, and invite people along. We could leave the Welcome Packs in estate Sales Offices – it might benefit them, too.'
- 'We don't currently cater for the whole family on a Sunday. The vicar has often talked about re-launching Sunday School, but nothing has happened. We could develop links with the Uniformed Groups in the Eccles Hall, and invite them to church parades. And we could develop the links between St John's and Backworth Park Primary School. We could invite RE lessons to come and explore St John's. We could form an 'Open the Book' team for acting out Bible stories in school assemblies. We could work alongside the school e.g. to sing carols outside the new Pavilion pub in Backworth.'
- 'People like doing things outside we could develop this.

 Lots of people from Earsdon and Backworth gather at the

 War Memorials on Remembrance Sunday: how about
 arranging an event to mark the anniversary of the Hartley Pit
 Disaster? We could gather at the Monument and read out the
 names of the victims. Afterwards, we could offer people a hot
 cup of coffee in a cosy church. '

- 'During the pandemic we sang 'Carols by the Swings' in Earsdon play park, accompanied by the Salvation Army band. Perhaps we shouldn't lose sight of that as well.'
- 'We could mount a Flower Festival. These are popular, and we have very good flower arrangers in our number.
 Something like this could build on the great success of the Scarecrow Festival and Heritage Open Days.'
- 'What about introductory courses? I was introduced back into church through the 'Alpha Course'. Something like that really helps people to asks lots of questions they have about faith.'
- 'Are we overlooking our pubs? Our publicans might be very happy to host a carol sing, or a harvest sing. The Glastonbury Festival has a very popular 'sing along to old favourites from school assemblies'. And it would be win-win if we helped put more money across the bar.
- Meanwhile, we recognised that St Alban's choir is a bit stuck, like the congregation. How might we draw more people into the life of the choir? Perhaps the choir could be opened to new people who might like to sing the Christmas music. Who knows? Come the New Year they might have caught the bug and want to continue.

Rivers of ideas are great, but they come with a potential problem. Too many ideas, and you end up confused, and unsure about what to do. That's where the Church Council now needs to continue its work. We need to discern, from God, a realistic plan for our life together 2025-2030. What's realistic to take on?

Might some of these ideas be gently let go of? What's the right order to do things? These are the questions that will occupy us as we move on from our Away Day.

Towards the end of the day, Jo McEvedy suggested a possible image that might tie a lot of this thinking together. She reminded us of those moments in the gospel that are all about *seeds*. The sower sows seeds all over the place. Not all of them grow. Some fall on the hard-trodden path, others fall into good soil. Not all of our seeds will grow... but that doesn't stop us sowing them anyway.

And, Jo concluded, Jesus told a story about a mustard seed. Starting small, it grew into a large bush, and 'the birds of the air' came to its branches. Might that be a picture for our life together, and for that of our Roman Catholic friends, as we continue our journey together under God?

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The 10th anniversary of Earsdon Scarecrow Festival took place on Saturday, 13th September 2025.



Weather Outlook for the month of October 2025.

Direct from the Captain's Charts.

Ex Hurricane Storm Amy heralds the first of the named storms at the beginning of the Autumnal Equinox. The winds were forecasted to increase from the Southwest late Friday becoming stronger and veering from the West and peaking on Saturday, reducing steadily on Sunday (5th), I predict the remnants of Amy will stay with us for a couple of days into the new week giving unsettled weather as it heads further north and declines.

The beginning to mid October.

To start the period the UK will be subject to a broad westerly weather pattern allowing weak frontal systems to spread in from the Atlantic. Within this, we are likely to see further spells of rain or drizzle and strong winds at times affecting northern and western areas, it is likely that all parts of the UK could see much rain from time to time. As the month progresses there is a signal, albeit a weak one, for pressure to build in the vicinity of the UK, with a better chance of more areas seeing some longer drier interludes. On the whole temperatures look to be fairly close to average, although some chilly nights are to be expected at times.


Mid to the end of October.


The mid to the latter half of October will likely see a transition to more widely unsettled conditions once more with successive depressions moving in from the Atlantic or a rather slower evolving weather pattern remains to be seen. There is a greater chance of more places seeing frequent spells of rain or showers with the possibly of strong winds.

Temperatures are predicted to remain close to average overall, with a reduced incidence of chilly nights compared to earlier in the month.

Harvest Festival


Earsdon and Backworth celebrated Harvest Festival on Sunday September 28th. The 9am service at St John's, and the 10.30am service at St Alban's, and Children's Church in the afternoon back at St John's, all gathered significant contributions for 'The People's Kitchen'.

Owen and Phil then came in The People's Kitchen van to collect it all. Phil rolled a shopping trolley up the ramp and into the back of St Alban's. He stopped in his tracks and shouted for Phil: 'Phil – we need another trolley! Or two!' In the end, Phil and Owen filled three shopping trolleys full. They said they'd have to go straight back to the depot with it all before they could do another pick-up. 'Amazing!' Phil concluded: 'we've never collected so much in one go!' Thank you so much, everyone.

Meanwhile, the excellent sum of £554.77 was given to help farmers in Tanzania increase the yield of their harvest. There was a beautiful moment when young Sophie Lambert brought up the collection for Tanzania. Sophie is the daughter of Jennifer Lambert, who was there in the choir. Jennifer is the daughter of Suzanne Medows, who was there in the congregation. Suzanne is the daughter of Jim and Anne Appleby, who in the past took consignments of goods out to Tanzania. Many of these were donated by the congregation. It's special to think that our current new link with Tanzania is building on these rich links from the past.

I also thought you might like to note our running total since Harvest 2021. Including that first collection for Tanzania, we've now sent the Diocese of Central Tanganyika a total of £4,028. £2,687 of this is towards the work of Conservation Agriculture in the Diocese. £1,310 of this is the amount raised for the building of the new St Andrew's Church in our link village of Majeleko. And for the eagle-eyed, the remaining £31 was fees we paid to Barclays to transfer this money to St Andrew's.

All in the month of October *It was* ...

200 years ago, on 25th Oct 1825 that Johann Strauss II, was born. This Austrian composer is best known for his waltzes, including *The Blue Danube*.

125 years ago, on 20th Oct 1900 Five days later (6th Oct) Met P that the American aviation pioneers the Wright Brothers made their first untethered glider flight at Kill housing estate riot in Tottenha Devil Hills, in North Carolina.

100 years ago, on 13th Oct 1925 that Margaret Thatcher, Baroness Thatcher, was born. She was the first woman Prime Minister of Britain (1979-90). (Died 2013.)

90 years ago, on 12th Oct 1935 that Luciano Pavorotti, Italian operatic tenor, was born. Considered one of the finest tenors of the 20th century, and one of the most commercially successful of all time. (Died 2007.)

70 years ago, on 20th Oct 1955 that *The Return of the King*, the third and final part of J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings*, was published.

65 years ago, on 30th Oct 1965 that Diego Maradona was born. The Argentine football player, manager and coach is regarded as one of the greatest football players in history. (Died 2020.)

60 years ago, on 8th Oct 1965 that the Post Office Tower (now the BT Tower) in London was officially opened. It was the tallest building in the UK until 1980.

40 years ago, on 1st Oct 1985 that riots broke out in Toxteth in Liverpool and Peckham in London. Five days later (6th Oct) Met Police Constable Keith Blacklock was killed in the Broadwater Farm housing estate riot in Tottenham. He was the first British constable to be killed in a riot since 1833.

25 years ago, on 26th Oct 2000 that the BSE Inquiry Report was published in the UK. It concluded that the BSE (Mad Cow Disease) epidemic was caused by the use of infected meat and bone meal in cattle feed.

20 years ago, on 3rd Oct 2005 that Ronnie Barker, TV comedian, actor and writer, died. Known for *The Frost Report, The Two Ronnies, Porridge, Going Straight* and *Open All Hours*.

15 years ago, on 13th Oct 2010 that 33 Chilean miners who had been trapped underground for 69 days following the collapse of the San Jose copper-gold mine were rescued. Around one billion TV viewers around the world watched them being pulled to the surface one-by-one, in a specially designed capsule.

WORDSEARCH October 2025

To St Luke, whose feast-day is 18th October, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.
